




### **Questions For The AQG Board**

Q: What do our dues pay for?

A: This is a common question that is asked to the board. In order to answer, we first need to discuss the annual budget. See the attached grid showing the income and expenses for the 2022-2023 budget.

- Membership dues represent 97% of the true income for AQG.
- Bank charges are the amounts we pay to provide electronic payment through our website and at events.
- Insurance represents the liability insurance we carry for meetings and events.
- The guilt show is self financed from ticket sales and vendor income.
- The overall budget has more expenses than income which means the final number shows money from reserves (savings account).
- Office expense is the most with \$5.15 from each member going to pay for the office and storage. We
  have reduced this expense this year by closing the storage room and moving all of the quilt show items
  into the office.
- The 2nd highest expense is education with \$5.13 from each member. This represents our mission statement.
- The 3rd is mini grants. This is the amount we budget for each chapter to receive moneyfor charity work. \*New members pay \$30.00

Dear Aunt Quiltie - Advice Column,

Quilting is such a useful hobby, and it's one of the most fun. At least most of the time . . . sometimes it can become monotonous, tricky, and hard to get done if your sewing machine is on the fritz or if you messed up a stitch. But there are some ways to streamline the quilting process and make it more effective and enjoyable, just check out these quilting hacks.

#### **Quilting Hacks**

- It's important that you press your quilts rather than iron them. To press, you use the hot iron to crease the seam flat, then open up the seam in the back and iron it flat as well.
- When seam ripping, just pick every fourth or fifth stitch, and always do so from the bobbin side. This
  is a really quick way to easily pull out all your stitches so you can quickly start over.
- If you're having trouble putting together fabrics for a quilt, try starting with one pattern that you really love and then finding other prints that match the colors or coordinate. You don't even have to use the original fabric in the quilt, it's just a great way to inspire you to start.
- It's also a great idea to lay out your quilt pieces before you sew them together. Randomizing the pieces can leave with results you don't especially like. and planning it out beforehand makes it all a little easier.
- Aunt Quiltie recommends spraying your fabric pieces with starch before piecing them together. This will keep your fabric stiff so that it doesn't pucker or gather during the sewing process. And once you wash the quilt the fabric will be cozy and soft again.
- Once you've sewed on one side of binding, press the binding flat, fold it over, press it again, and then securing the binding with binder clips. This will make hand-sewing the backside of your quilt a piece of cake!
- If you want to make sure you never lose your pins, glue a strong magnet to the bottom of your pin dish. You'll always have plenty of pins always handy.
- Looking for a better way to organize your fabric? Aunt Quiltie recommends filing it away! Just fold your different fabrics over the rim of an office folder and file it away in a filing cabinet! Pretty cool right? So easy!
- Keeping your scissors sharp is key to pulling off a gorgeous quilt. Keep yours working their best by regularly sharpening the blades.

At our June meeting, we held our annual election of officers with the following results: Ruth Faulls, Chair; Nancy Pitts, Vice Chair; Judy Blake, Secretary; and Susan Ross, Treasurer. New committee chairs were also named: Jo Willis, Charity; Ila Lewis, Hospitality; Marlys Houge, Programs.

Following that a lengthy discussion was held regarding the draft revisions to our by-laws which the By-Laws Committee has been working on. Drafts will be emailed to everyone to review and compare with our old by-laws and AQG's current ones. Further discussion will then be held before finalization is done.

In preparation for Christmas in July, Lynn Pinda showed several examples of simple and fast projects so new members would have an idea of the kind of thing we'd be looking for. Sign-up sheets were circulated for volunteers to demonstrate projects.

As the prize for our next quarterly raffle, Karen Stegwell donated a beautiful turquoise and teal quilt made by her daughter. This is the second such donation Karen and her daughter have made.

Our July meeting was the first for new officers, board members, and committee chairs. During the meeting, we discussed the updating being done to our By-Laws and the job descriptions contained therein. It was decided to wait for approval of the drafts until our September meeting.

We are doing quite well with quilts, pillowcases, and totes for New Life, our main charity, and we will soon be delivering a lot of items to them. Discussion was held regarding our quarterly charity selections for the third and fourth quarters. The third quarter will focus on making quilts to send to CWSGlobal, an organization that has requested 700 quilts to be put into Welcome Backpacks for Ukrainian children arriving in the U.S. this fall. Requested sizes are 43" x 55" or 50" x 60" and we already have several being

made. For the fourth quarter our project will be in support of Interfaith Refugee/Asylum Seekers Volunteers. This group needs simple drawstring-type bags with shoulder straps that can be given to immigrants after crossing the border. Immigrants are only allowed to cross the border with whatever belongings they can put in a gallon plastic bag so our bags will give them something to put essentials in once they cross.

Being Christmas in July, several members demonstrated easy gifts that would make quick Christmas presents or just be useful around the house.

Ellen Born gave a presentation about our Opportunity Quilt and demonstrated how to lay out the blocks for easier assembly. All blocks have been cut and each block put in a bag along with a color chart and assembly instructions so members can take a block or two (or more) if they wish to participate. At this time two thirds of the blocks have found a home and the rest will hopefully be "adopted" when vacationing members return.

#### **Busy Bees of NW Phoenix**

At our May meeting Betsy presented an excellent demo on how to create scalloped edges/waves. Her handout, from a class with Susan Sorenson, had clear instructions and reminders 'just in case' some of us don't attempt them until "someday".

At that meeting Donna brought in nine quilts headed to *Sleep in Heavenly* Peace, a volunteer organization that builds beds for kids who are sleeping on the floor. Sharon had turned her popsicles, from our earlier block exchange, into a happy summer wall-hanging. Bobbi trotted out a couple of tops that (once quilted) will be headed to a domestic violence shelter in the West Valley. Blue jellyroll quilts from our 'race' in March continue to roll in and add to our stash for outreach, like the one Grace brought in.

The challenge self-portraits were due at our June meeting, and the rest of us were challenged to guess who each one represented. Some were easier to match with their maker than others.











Pennie was our June tip-of-the-day presenter, and had three to share with us. Her first was that pressing seams open on half-square triangle blocks enables you to match them up, and her temperature quilt proved how well that works. Her second tip, to line up selvages to find the straight of grain (instead of relying on the factory fold) before squaring off the end of fabric will ensure that fabric lies flat. Her third tip was a way to pin both sides of nesting seams that ensures fabrics don't move *and* you won't have to sew over the pin.

Show & Tell is always fun. When new member Jo Ann displayed her dramatic blue/green geometric quilt there were requests for her to do a class - and happily she has agreed to that. Pat and Pennie brought in quilts they'd made from Susan's kits, while Louise had been busy finishing up some UFOs.

The fifth Wednesday of any month is slated to work on quilts for Outreach (nee Charity), and on June 29 that fun will include an Ice Cream Social afterward – perfect during these rather toasty days!

Upcoming for the Busy Bees: An Outreach Sew Day followed by a Taco Potluck Lunch; A "Bee" Fabric Exchange to be used in a Bzzzzz Mini Quilt (pattern to be provided in September); and a Fall Block Challenge.

#### Busy Bees of NW Phoenix Continued

At the July Business Meeting of the Busy Bees, Louise Grant gave a very interesting presentation on the Wool Penny Rugs. Penny rugs are not actual "rugs, but are decorative wool "mini" mats for tables, mantles and other furniture. They are believed to have been started in the 1800's during the Civil War by homemakers who used a "penny" as one of the circle templates. (Ref.: The History of "Penny Rugs, Homeschool in the Woods) Louise showed different samples of the wool mats that she has made, and offered several patterns for the members to use to learn this process. 
We've had lots of excitement at our July 5th meeting! Kathy Kraig's presented her "Pups" challenge for 2021 - 2022. The

#### **Mavericks** of Tempe

Mavericks kept busy this spring and summer filling a need identified by one of our members: tote bags for refugees arriving at Sky Harbor International Airport. Jo Van Loo volunteers at the airport, and noticed that people coming into the airport from a refugee welcome center were carrying all of their possessions in flimsy, plastic, grocerystyle bags which easily ripped. She saw that cloth tote bags would be a vast improvement and a caring gesture.

She adjusted a pattern taught to Mavericks by Marla Hattabaugh earlier in the year, and began making totes. She told this story at a meeting early in the summer and we



turned one of our meetings into a sew day. The guidelines were to use drapery weight fabric that is



thicker than standard quilter's cotton material. Straps could be made from folded fabric strips or fabric strapping. Those of us who used quilter's cotton, lined the totes with an additional layer of fabric. The bottom of the bags was shaped by sewing triangles on each side of the bottom to form a rectangle shape. The totes were open at the top, with the two straps sized so that they could be easily carried by hand or over a shoulder. Because most of the refugees are passing through Phoenix, the totes were sized to fit under an airplane seat.

Between the sew day and at-home production, Mavericks completed 200 totes, which have been delivered and disbursed. Each recipient picks the tote she or he wants, creating a connection between maker and receiver, even though they will likely never meet.
