
A little Quilting/Sewing Humor.....

As part of the office move, I needed to deliver the donated items for fun day to the fun day coordinator. This consisted of 8 totes, 1 large cardboard box and a metal popcorn tin filled with buttons. First issue, all of the carts were at the quilt show which meant I had to hand carrier the totes down the elevator to my car. The cardboard box was the heaviest, so I decided to put that on the ice chest with wheels to get it down the elevator. And, to top it off I put the button tin on the top. I thought that was a good choice, I thought wrong. I got the items into the elevator but when I tried to exit the elevator the ice chest wheels got stuck in the track. I leaned over to unstick the wheels and this is where things went from good to bad. The button tin went off the top and fell into the door of the elevator. The box crashed, split open and spewed fabric and notions all over the foray. I pushed the ice chest into the foray and turned around to get the button tin. Before I could grab it, the elevator doors closed, crushing the tin and exploding buttons all over the elevator. At this point, I used a sewing expletive -'Stupid empty bobbin'. I got on my hands and knees to start picking up buttons out of the elevator. The elevator doors continue to try to close and are now hitting me on my backside. Bump. Bump. I am scooping buttons as fast as I can but the buttons are all in the track of the elevator. I am using my keys to dig out the buttons. Bump. Bump. I no longer care about saving the buttons and am pushing the buttons down the elevator gap. They are making a sound like a slot machine at the casino. Someday someone is going to wonder why there are buttons at the bottom of the elevator shaft. Bump. Bump. I think I might have enough cleaned out and let the doors close. Nope. They don't want to close. Time for another sewing expletive, 'Dumb rotary cutter!' So, back again to picking out buttons. Bump. Bump. I try again and the doors close. I am so happy. This is short-lived. I hit the button to open the doors and they open an inch and get stuck. I am now stuck inside the elevator. I start to cry and yell the most awful of sewing expletives, "For the love of seam rippers.". I do not know what to do. Fire department – nope. Call the number in the elevator? Do I call my husband? About the time I am ready to make a decision, I hear a little voice say, 'Is there someone in the elevator?'. Yes, I am here. A group of guys helped get the door open and then I hear one of them say, 'Why are there buttons all over the place?'. That is a long story.

Dear Aunt Quiltie - Advice Column, How come my cutting mats have to be replaced often? What can I do to keep using them for years?

Great question. Here are a few tips.

Keep them **Clean**, keep'em **Moist**, keep'em **flat**, and **NO** heat. Standard cutting mats range from 12 x18 to 24x36. Mats 40x72 and larger are available to cover entire surface of a cutting table in one piece or as section. Choose the larges mat that fits the work and storage areas available.



Olfa mats love moisture, it is recommended you soak your mat from time to time. Your self-healing mat loves moisture. To soak, put your mat in a large bathtub or larger container (would have to be large enough so it can lay flat) let it soak for 15-20 in a mixture of 1/4 cup of white vinegar to every gallon of cool water. Use cool water repeat, cool water do this often to extend its useful life. Dry thoroughly and lay flat to dry, turning over and wiping with towel.

To clean use a squirt of mild dishwashing soap (Ivory) and clean mat with a soft brush like a tooth brush. The purpose of this gentle scouring is to remove the fiber that gets trapped in the cut marks preventing the cuts from healing.

To get rid of odors on mats use a mixture of equal part white vinegar and cool water. Wipe your mat, let set for a few minutes, rinse and pat dry with a towel.

It is important to clean fibers out of your mats. Fiber that is embedded in the mat can be extracted with a little bit of friction use your thumb or finger and rub along the line where the fibers are and they should come right out. A small rubber tool could also be used just not anything that would leave residue behind like the pink pencil eraser.

In summary,

- 1. Always lay your mat flat
- 2. Don't iron on it
- 3. Do not place it close to a heat vent
- 4. Store flat
- 5. Do not leave in a hot car (especially if you are going on a retreat)
- 6. Avoid direct sunlight
- 7. Remove fibers from cuts

Daisy Mountain Quilters of Anthem



Blocks or quilts can be sent to the national headquarters, Daisy

Mountain QOV or the other two groups in Arizona. We know how expensive quilting is so contributions of fabric (does not have to be patriotic), batting, and/or money are greatly appreciated.




The Activities Committee has decided to wait on plans for an overnight retreat until later in the year due to June being a busy month for graduations and weddings.





changes. After discussion and approval by the board, the revisions were approved by the membership at the March meeting.


Members of Community Service gathered and assembled kits for charity quilts. Winter visitors are encouraged to take a kit and

Quilters Anonymous of Goodyear




Chapter Charity Spotlight
