## Extra: Quilting News

### **NEXT GEN Program**

One of our key goals at AQG is to introduce young people (i.e. the next generation) to the art of quilting. Late last year we formed a small team of AQG members who were committed to this goal. After many hours of brainstorming and planning we are ready to announce there will be a NEXT GEN program at our March quilt show. The NEXT GEN program is a set of incentives and special activities specifically geared to young people.

First of all, there will be a NEXT GEN booth at the quilt show which will be the starting point for many of the activities such as:

- Touchable displays of various fabrics, battings, threads
- Quilt block coloring pages
- Hand quilting hands on activity
- Sewing blocks together on a sewing machine
- Scavenger Hunt 3 fat quarters to everyone who finishes the scavenger hunt
- Educational tours of the quilt displays (afternoon only) led by experienced quilters
- A raffle for a new sewing machine (open only to someone under 18)

In addition, to incentivize parents to bring young people to the show, we are offering a voucher that would allow a young person (under 18) plus one accompanying adult into the show <u>for free</u> on Friday and Saturday. (We hope some of the accompanying adults will also gain an appreciation for quilts and maybe take up the hobby themselves.)

### **MJ Kinman**

MJ KINMAN will be our keynote instructor and speaker at this year's quilt show. Her passion is creating textile artwork inspired by faceted gemstones.



MJ's work has been exhibited at the National Quilt Museum, the International Quilt Museum, the New England Quilt Museum, Quilt Festival (Houston, TX), Quilt Week (Paducah, KY), Festival of Quilts (Birmingham, UK), and Art Quilt Elements (Wayne, PA).

Her work is included in collections as varied as Maker's Mark Distillery, the National Quilt Museum (Paducah, KY) and the International Quilt Museum (Lincoln, NE), plus many private collections around the United States.

Her first book, Gemstone Quilts, was released in 2020. Her work has also been featured in periodicals published by both the quilting and jewelry industries. Most recently, her work can be found in author and historian Linda LaPinta's new book Kentucky Quilts and Quiltmakers: Three Centuries of Creativity, Community, and Commerce (University Press of Kentucky, 2023). In it, LaPinta writes: "MJ Kinman…emerged as a premier art quilter in the first quarter of the twenty-first century."



Most importantly, though, the underlying message to my audiences throughout my presentation is the importance of choosing joy and saying "no" to fear, both in our creative lives and in our personal lives.

Color plays a pivotal role in my gem quilts. Over the past 25+ years I've learned ways to approach color with confidence and I'm delighted to

share these ideas with you in this lecture.

Using a standard color wheel, I'll describe how our brains crave harmony and why certain color combinations satisfy that craving. We'll then move beyond basic color theory to exploring how a color can "change" simply by being placed to other colors. Josef Albers, the great artist/instructor of the 20 th century, wrote about these ideas in his groundbreaking book Interaction of Color. However, they were introduced in the early 1800s by a scientist named Michel Eugene Chevreul.



### Lenna DeMarco



LENNA DeMARCO is a former professional dancer and choreographer, spent 35 years as a professor of dance, teaching and performing both in AZ and nationally. She currently spends her time researching and writing about quilt history as well as presenting lectures, workshops and trunk shows.

One of the most challenging and admired quilt styles of the 19<sup>th</sup> century is the beautiful red and green applique quilts. They often were created as a showcase of a woman's needle skills and were considered her "best" quilt if not her masterpiece. 1840 to 1870 marked the high point of the style. Through numerous examples, this presentation will explore the history of these beauties from their stunning needlework in the early years to their decline in the last decades of the century. Be prepared to be awed!



### **Penny Boese and Cindy Stohn**

CINDY STOHN is a proud descendant of ingenious makers and garage inventors. She has been working with textiles (and other media) since she was very small. Cindy made her first quilt when she was 15, finishing a quilt made from the scraps of her handmade baby clothes. She began sewing and quilting in a major way over 25 years ago. When she retired from corporate life in 2016 she began long-arm guilting for herself and others. Cindy has won multiple awards at local, regional and international guilt shows for both design and guilting.





PENNY BOESE made her first quilt in junior high with scraps from clothes and leftovers from projects her Mom made. But it wasn't until 2000 – after a career as a reporter and a university career counselor—that she truly began quilting. From the start, Penny wanted to work her quilts from beginning to end, so the purchase of her Long Arm in 2014 was a natural progression. Since then, Penny has designed her own award-winning quilts and earned many more awards for her custom quilting of client quilts.


It was nice to catch up with everyone that could make it to the meeting. Show n Tell was fun - good to see what members had been working on through the snowy days.

Is there any better way to get energized about quilting than a good trunk show?

Cindy Bader, the designer of Patterns on the Prairie, shared "Mosaic Applique." Her patterns literally look like beautiful mosaics, with small to medium pieces arranged with just a hint of background showing. Her work differs in approach from what most of us use in fusible ap-

plique in that she uses Hot Fix Adhesive, which forms a permanent bond. Because there are no fibers or webbing, quilters need not worry about fraying, stretching or needing to edge stitch. This leaves plenty of negative

space to freely quilt her patterns as desired. Cindy offered 2 classes and the results were beautiful. (See photos.) We look forward to seeing more of these beautiful quilts as members complete them.


